Sorkness to lead Wisconsin Healthy Homes Initiative

School of Pharmacy (SOP) and School of Medicine Prof. Christine Sorkness was recently awarded a three-year, \$1.2 million grant by the US Department of Housing and Urban Development. The project targets three major health problems—asthma, home injuries, and lead poisoning—among pre-school aged children in low-income families.

Under this project, called the Wisconsin Healthy Homes Initiative, a multi-disciplinary, multi-agency team will evaluate more than 700 families each year for environmental risks in their homes that contribute to these health problems.

The Initiative will test different strategies to reduce and eliminate the identified home risks and determine if the interventions have persisting value. Families will be identified through Dane County Head Start which has collaborated with Dr. Sorkness for eight years on asthma studies. Project Home, a Madison housing and weatherization agency, will remove lead and make other home improvements.

The Wisconsin team won the grant through a competitive proposal process and will be part of the national Healthy Homes Initiative. Other national grant recipients include the Harvard School of Public Health, the Illinois Department of Public Health, and the Medical and Health Research Association of New York City, Inc.

Also collaborating on the project is the Bureau of Environmental Health of the Wisconsin Department of Health and Family Services. Dr. Sorkness' co-investigators are Dr. Murray Katcher, a pediatrician and nationally recognized injury risk specialist, and Joe Schirmer, a noted lead expert in Madison. Dr. Robert Bush of the School of Medicine will serve as the primary consultant for the environmental asthma risk assessments and control strategies.

Asthma screening and education

The idea for the Initiative evolved from Sorkness' previous research program. For eight years she has led a successful collaboration with Dane County Head Start to screen annually for asthma among 600 enrolling preschool-aged children. Project funding came from the National Institute of Allergic and Infectious Diseases, a division of the National Institutes of Health, as part of a larger Allergic Disease Center grant led by Dr. William Busse of the School of Medicine.

Asthma is the most common chronic disease of childhood. It affects about six to seven percent of the US population. However, epidemiologic studies reported asthma prevalence as high as 10-20 percent in some at-risk populations, especially in the country's inner cities.

The SOP research group was surprised to discover a 15.8% prevalence of asthma in the Dane County Head Start population as reported by parents and diagnosed by physicians. The rate was consistent over all the years of the study.

Sorkness hypothesized that these children faced risks for asthma similar to those of inner-city children—poverty, environmental exposures, and minority ethnicity. She concluded that the Head Start model was ideal to identify high-risk children with asthma and implement strategies to improve their outcomes.

The next step was to use pharmacists as asthma counselors and to evaluate their effectiveness in improving various asthma outcomes in these children. Families agree to participate in a program where children are randomly assigned either to the Pharmacist Asthma Counselor or to continue with usual medical care.

In the counseling group the asthma counselor made a baseline asthma risk assessment at a home visit and developed personalized asthma education using guidelines from the National Asthma Education and Prevention Program. The pharmacist research team has made over 200 home visits to these families as part of the project.

The counselors trained parents or caregivers in asthma management and developed a written asthma management plan for the home and Head Start classroom, collaborating with the child's primary care physician. In addition, they worked to empower families to use entitled health care resources emphasizing preventive asthma care. Key research team members include research fellows and associates: Catherine Decker, Kelly McGill, Anthony Staresinic, and Valerie Schend.

Home visits helped identify potential environmental risks for asthma in these children's homes. Sixty-nine percent of

The graduation this May of the first all-Doctor of Pharmacy class was an event we all looked forward to for many years. When this class enrolled in the fall of 1997, they were pre-

sented with an entirely new curriculum designed to be more challenging and to better prepare students for the changes in the profession.

The original thought behind this all-PharmD movement was that pharmacists should extend their activities to patient care, specifically to drug therapy instead of adhering to the century-old tradition of focusing on procurement, preparation and evaluation of drug products. Improvements in automated dispensing technologies have diminished—and will continue to diminish—the pharmacist's role in drug dispensing.

Today, increasingly complicated and expensive drugs, drug regimens, and

diagnostic technologies have created demand for cost-effective management of treatments and information.

All of these have contributed to the empowerment of pharmacists to shift their practices away from providing commodities toward patient care, information, and pharmacotherapy management.

While this graduating class was participating in clerkships this past year, practitioners were praising their knowledge and ability. The students' communication skills with patients and with other health professionals indicated we were on the right track. Even so, we will constantly be evaluating and fine-tuning what we teach because we know no curriculum is ever perfect.

We are preparing for a future in which the pharmacist's role will expand as a vital member of the health care team. Our graduates have been provided with a solid foundation, a core of knowledge from which to grow and provide vital services today and in the future.

For those working with our new graduates, we would appreciate hearing from you as you assess your new fellow pharmacists. To our graduates, we ask you to keep in touch, use your education well, and continue to be life-long learners.

In Memoriam: Professor Joe Wiederholt



Joe Wiederholt, PhD, RPh, died in May following a long and courageous battle with colon cancer. He began his tenure at the UW School of Pharmacy in 1981 where he

was a Professor of Pharmacy Administration. Joe was known for his love of pharmacy and his commitment to the education of pharmacists and pharmacy students. He is remembered for his teaching, his patient/consumer-oriented research, and service to his profession. He received the annual teaching award for teaching excellence seven times and was the recipient of the 2000 Distinguished Pharmacy Educator Award presented by the American Association of Colleges of Pharmacy. He served as the chair of the State of Wisconsin Pharmacy Internship Board and as a consultant to the Pharmacy Examining Board.

Joe was an avid fly fisherman. He focused his priorities on what he considered most important in life: faith, family, health, and relationships with people and nature. He touched others with his friendship, his humor, and his passion for teaching (as well as his Snoopy ties and chocolate chip cookies). He is survived by his wife, Peggy, his son, Jade and his daughter, Mekel.

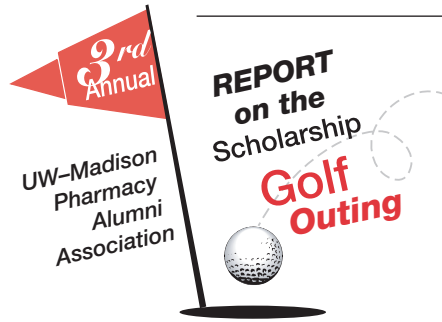

children tested by skin-prick showed rapid allergic reaction to one or more antigens, primarily dust mite, alternaria, and cockroach. All are documented contributors to asthma in children and are clearly present in these homes. When the US Department of Housing and Urban Development announced funding initiatives to improve the health of homes, Dr. Sorkness saw an opportunity to continue collaborating with Head Start and helping hundreds of low-income preschool-aged children.
